ORDINANCE NO. 8865

AN ORDINANCE APPROVING THE FIVE-YEAR INSTITUTIONAL DEVELOPMENT PLAN OF THE UNIVERSIDAD DE MANILA (UDM), AS APPROVED BY ITS BOARD OF REGENTS, PURSUANT TO SECTION 23 OF MANILA CITY ORDINANCE (MCO) NO. 8750, THE CHARTER OF UDM, WHICH AMENDED MCO NOS. 7885, 8120 AND 8635, PROVIDING FUNDS THEREFOR AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES

PREAMBLE

WHEREAS, Universidad de Manila (UDM) has come a long way as an educational institution since it was established by the City Government of Manila way back in 1995 as the then City College of Manila (CCM);

WHEREAS, the current administration of the City of Manila led by Mayor Francisco “Isko Moreno” Domagoso, who is also the ex-officio Chairman of the Board of Regents of UDM, seeks the Commission on Higher Education’s (CHED) recognition of UDM as a HIGHER EDUCATION INSTITUTION or “HEI”;

WHEREAS, should UDM obtain HEI status upon due recognition and conferment by CHED, UDM will then be a rightful recipient of various substantial subsidies and/or funding from the National Government that will surely boost UDM’s institutional capabilities to provide accessible, free and quality education to the youth of the City of Manila;

WHEREAS, in order for UDM to successfully obtain CHED’s “institutional recognition” as an HEI, UDM needs to comply with CHED’s requirements as stated under CHED Memorandum Order (CMO) No. 32, Series of 2006 and CMO No. 42, Series of 2016, both CMOs being the bases of CHED’s “Validation Tool”, entitled: “Compliance to Requirements for Recognition as Higher Education Institution/Certificate of Authority to establish a Higher Education Institution”;

WHEREAS, pursuant to CMO No. 32, Series of 2006, particularly Section 2(d) or Article V thereof, there should be “a five-year institutional development plan duly approved by the Sanggunian which shall include but not limited to the following a) annual budgetary allocation...”;

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 23 of Manila City Ordinance (MCO) No. 8750, the Charter of the Universidad de Manila (UDM), which amended MCO Nos. 7885, 8120 and 8635, the City Council shall approve the Institutional Development Plan (IDP) submitted by UDM, as duly approved by the latter’s Board of Regents, to ensure that said IDP of UDM be incorporated and/or integrated into the formulation of the corresponding plans and budget of the City Government of Manila: NOW, THEREFORE,

Be it ordained by the City Council of Manila, in session assembled, *THAT*:

SECTION 1. Declaration of Policy. – It shall hereby be declared the policy of the City of Manila to be genuinely committed, in consonance with the policy of the State, in promoting the right of all citizens to quality education at all levels and to make such education accessible to all.

SEC. 2. Approval of the Institutional Development Plan (IDP) of the Universidad de Manila (UDM). – Pursuant to Section 23 of Manila City Ordinance (MCO) No. 8750, the Charter of the Universidad de Manila (UDM), which amended MCO Nos. 7885, 8120 and 8635, the City Council shall approve the Institutional Development Plan (IDP) submitted by UDM, as duly approved by the latter’s Board of Regents, to ensure that said IDP of UDM be incorporated and/or integrated into the formulation of the corresponding plans and budget of the City Government of Manila.

As such, the IDP of UDM, as cited below, is hereby approved by the City Council through this Ordinance:

SEC. 3. Appropriations. – The amounts needed to carry out the implementation of the above-cited IDP of UDM shall be incorporated into the annual budget allocated to UDM by the City Government of Manila, subject to availability of funds and the needs of the entire City of Manila and the various departments and instrumentalities of the City Government of Manila.


SEC. 4. Separability Clause. – Should any provision herein be declared unconstitutional, the same shall not affect the validity of the other provisions of this Ordinance.

SEC. 5. Repealing Clause. – All previous ordinances, orders, rules, regulations and issuances or parts thereof inconsistent with the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed or modified accordingly.


SEC. 6. Effectivity Clause. – This Ordinance shall take effect upon its approval.

This Ordinance was finally enacted by the City Council of Manila on April 28, 2022.

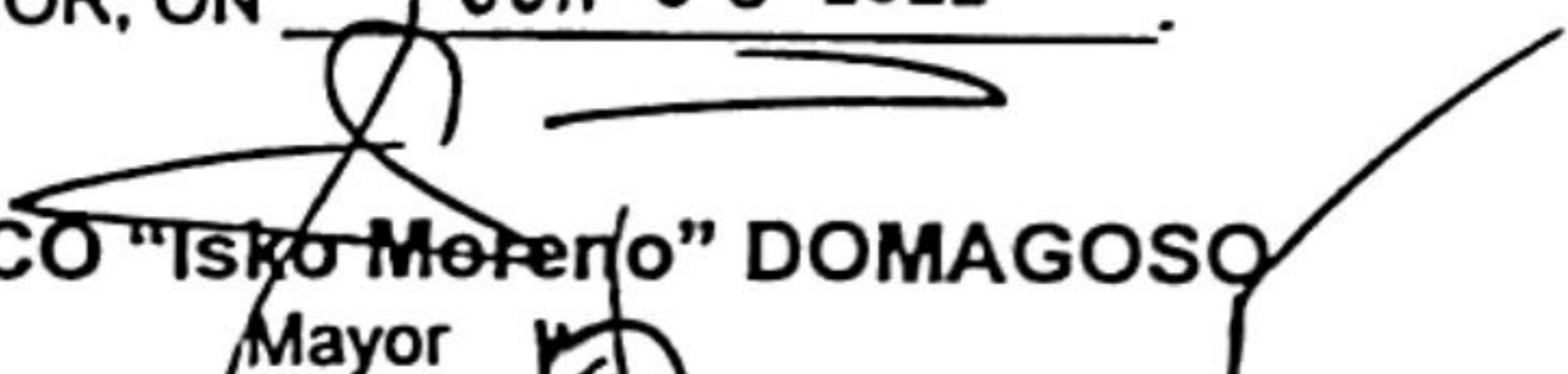

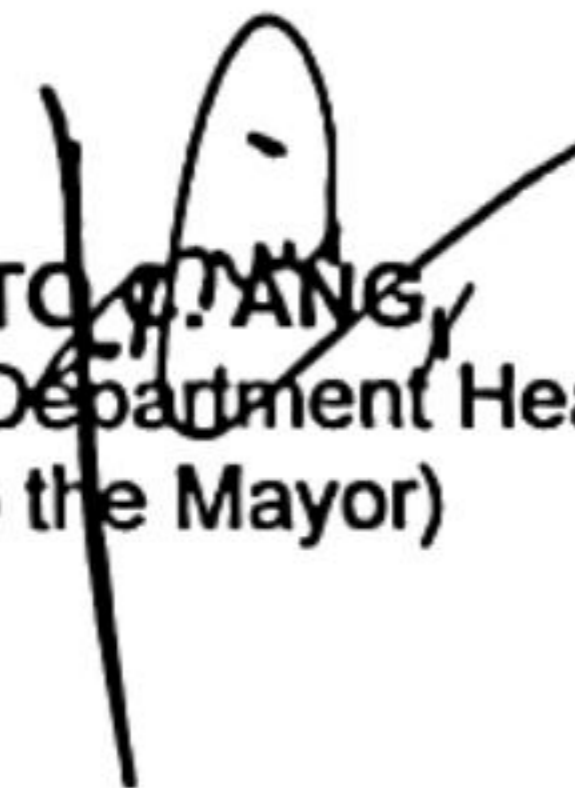
